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I am often asked the question: Are you a class of interactive notebooks of your students? The short answer is yes and no. Let me explain. Before I start, I want to emphasize that I teach second grade, so this is what works for me and my elementary school students. An important part of my interactive math notebooks includes the classification component. I'll start by saying that I don't GRADE every single PAGE! Not only is it a lot of time, but I also don't feel that second-graders should be evaluated on how they practice new concepts. If I'm going to take a grade on the INB page, I'm going to choose a page that I feel students should have a good understanding before assembling the page. I also tell my students when I take the class for their assignment. Here's an anchor chart that I'm going to drop at the beginning of the school year. I've been sliding it on my wall and we're talking about every ranking in detail. I have my students come up with why they think that every example is a 1-star, 2-star, and 3-star job. When they give me their reasons, I write them on the offer of stripes with arrows that point to an example on the poster. This anchor chart is displayed and referenced throughout the year. If a student is going to earn 3 stars for their assignment, there are 5 components that I'm looking at that should be their 2nd grade better. You'll notice that each of these components is tagged in the photo above. 3-star Criterion: 1. The name of the activity is at the top of the page and is written in beautiful handwriting. 2. The date is written in the top right corner with good handwriting. 3. All flip flaps/pieces cut nicely on the lines. The answers are clear and thorough with several strategies displayed (if applicable). 5. Coloring is done neatly with more than one color (if applicable). 2-Star Criterion: 1. The activity name is at the top of the page with legible handwriting. 2. The date is written in the top right corner with legible handwriting. 3. All flip flaps/pieces are cut and glued to the laptop. Responses are written with a strategy (if applicable). 5. Coloring is done with more than one color (if applicable). 1-Star Criterion 1. The name of the action is NOT at the top of the page. 2. The date is not written in the top right corner. 3. Some flip flaps/pieces are cut and glued to the laptop. 4. Responses are basic or incorrect with NO strategies displayed. 5. No coloring or very little coloring is done and can be messy. Just the other day I was asked this question... Why do you only put page numbers on the right side of your laptop? is the answer. The reason we only put page numbers on the right side is because if it's not a double page activity, my feedback and classification gets written on the left side of the laptop. As you can see from my examples above, I provide feedback to the star rating. I think it's important to be specific about what I feel students are doing well and what they need to improve. When I provide feedback to my my I always try to give them a sandwich with compliments. The only time I find it difficult is when there is exactly what I am looking for. The image below gives the best visual that I mean the term compliment sandwich. I feel that if our feedback to them only includes suggestions or areas that need improvement, it becomes too negative. At the same time, you can't just give compliments to what they're doing well because they'll never know they need to work. Sense? Another point that I want to do about classification is that if a student gets a 1-star rating, he will always have a comment that they need to come to me so we can work out the fight. My math time unit is organized so that my students can choose a math center to complete when they complete their independent assignment. My centers are independent because they are activities that strengthen skills that are already taught. I say this because it's a great time for students to come to me so we can go on a job or an interactive page of laptop math that didn't go well. I'm running a student report that I need to make sure that if they forget to come and see me, I can call them as soon as they finish their independent assignment.
